Expertise in western Canada Aboriginal history (including British Columbia and the North), comparative history (Canadian and American Wests), and working with Aboriginal communities would be an asset. Priority will be given to candidate with the completed PH.D., teaching experience (especially at the introductory level), and publications. This appointment will be at the floor of the Assistant Professor level (current starting salary \$85,984).
